


Nancy, originally from Arvada, Colorado, married Aje, an Akha leader and highly trained pastor. Together they run the orphanage.

Another day we went upstream in "long-tailed" boats to a village of the minority Karen tribe. These boats are needed in shallow water. The motor shaft to the propellor cannot be vertical. Instead it is very long and nearly

horizontal. The expert operator can swing the shaft and propellor side to side above the water and dip it a little into the water to give the boat a push or steer it in a different direction.
